

**Chris Wold****Professor of Law and Director, International Environmental Law Project**

Professor Chris Wold came to Lewis & Clark Law School in 1994 to bring an international environmental component to the school's environmental law program. In addition to teaching International Environmental Law and International Trade and the Environment, Professor Wold directs the law school's International Environmental Law Project, which provides students with practical experience in international environmental law, and teaches several international environmental law courses. He has traveled to Australia, Japan, Kenya, South Africa, Zimbabwe, and elsewhere to participate in negotiations relating to climate change, the Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species and the International Whaling Commission (IWC). He has assisted Pacific Island Developing States in the climate change negotiations and participated as the legal advisor to the United Kingdom at the IWC. He has helped Mauritius develop a plan to protect environmentally sensitive areas and traveled to India as part of the Narmada International Human Rights Panel to investigate environmental and human rights violations associated with a World Bank funded dam project. He is "Of Counsel" to the Environmental Law Alliance Worldwide-U.S. (E-LAW), which provides legal advice and assistance to a network of more than 200 public interest lawyers and scientists from more than 50 countries who are working to strengthen domestic environmental law. He previously was a member of the Environmental Protection Agency's National Advisory Committee to provide advice on matters relating to NAFTA's environmental commission.

He is the lead author of *Trade and the Environment: Law and Policy* (2d ed. 2012) and *Climate Change and the Law* (2d ed. 2012). He has also published numerous articles on international environmental law as well as the effects of trade law on the environment and environmental law. His recent scholarship includes *The Durban Package and the Goals of Pacific Small Island Developing States*, ASIL INSIGHTS, Jan. 6, 2012, *Leveraging Climate Change Benefits through the World Trade Organization: Are Fossil Fuel Subsidies Actionable?*, 43 GEORGETOWN J.
